Love of Books

Continues in Volunteer Work When Jerry Bruce thinks back on his past, he knows it was his destiny to become a librarian.

He was about 7 years old when one of his grandparents gave him a subscription to Double Day's Book of the Month "Children's Classics" series. These were great books, but the vocabulary was a bit challenging. So, he read the books with a dictionary by his side and developed an abiding love for reading.

In fifth grade, his class took a field trip to tour the local public library where he became fascinated with the card catalog. After that trip, the library became a great resource and familiar destination for him. At one point, a member of his family was struggling with a medical challenge. The librarian must have known about it because she brought him a special resource book to help him understand the intricacies of that challenge. He was really touched by that act of kindness.

Jerry is musically talented and graduated from Mansfield University with a degree in Music Education. After a few years of teaching at Chenango Bridge School District, a suburb of Binghamton, NY, Jerry realized that was not his true calling and resigned.

In search of a new job, he went to the Binghamton Public Library to inquire about a position as a clerk. Jerry got more than an application that day! Upon hearing of his interest, the receptionist introduced him to the director who interviewed him and immediately offered to train him to become the junior librarian. He describes leaving there feeling "as if he was on cloud 9". And thus began his career as a librarian.

After a year of training, the library granted him a scholarship to attend Syracuse University to pursue his master's degree in Library Science. After a few more years of working in Binghamton, Jerry relocated to the Lancaster area and spent most of his career working as a Reference Librarian at the Lancaster County Library.

Jerry met his beautiful wife, Sandy, while they were in college. They have been married for 54 years and have four lovely daughters, including a set of twins.

Eighteen months ago, he and Sandy moved into Woodcrest Villa. Shortly thereafter, he began volunteering in the Margaret Derstine Library on campus because, as he explains, "I wanted to pay it forward and work as a librarian at Woodcrest because the library has been so great to me over the years."

It is such an honor to recognize Jerry for all he is doing for our Woodcrest community, and to thank him for doing an incredible job!

Each member makes a minimum annual contribution of \$500, and every dollar supports Benevolent Care.

When initially asked if I would be willing to share why I contribute to MHC Benevolent Care, my first reaction was one of great reluctance.

In Matthew 5:16a, we are commanded to "let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works". Then in Matthew 6:3-4, it is written "But when you give to the needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your giving may be in secret." These two verses seem to contradict each other, and therein was the source of my reluctance. In studying these passages and further reading, I really think that the need to check our motives for our giving are at the heart of these verses. Hebrews 10:24 instructs us "to spur one another on toward love and good deeds."

Ultimately, I choose to contribute to Benevolent Care to make a difference in the lives of my neighbors who outlive their resources. My humble desire is to "spur" (or encourage—if you prefer) others to help MHC maintain their tradition of providing care for life to all residents.

It is not the amount you contribute that matters. What matters is a heart of awareness to offer love, assistance and compassion for our neighbors who live right next door.




Gingerbread House Contest WOWS
